Jan 21, 1905

My Dearest,

I came back from Tonopah last night on stage, went over there to take the tram back Mr. Willis loaned me to drive over here.

I found four dear letters awaiting me from you, I will sign Bank slip & return right.

Write South Fork man to feed the hay him self & Ed can attend to measuring it.

I am awfully lonesome but am going to try & hit it before I stop. I am afraid I haven't got as much as I thought at first in my lease, all though I am still digging at it, have two samples being assayed now, will hear from them tomorrow, Stanley is driving water wagon. Am writing on my lap, no table here. If Tom hadn't ought to have his neck broken, I am another, too bad. Isn't Dan's letter fine? Is doing so well. I wired Louis to come up, if he dosen't I am afraid I'll have to stop. Will stay a few days yet any way. If I don't strike it can't keep it going on my own money. You know. I have a notion to go home & rig out a pck outfit & prospect his southern country, but some at at home first. It would cost too much to rig out here.

Will write you again to-morrow. You don't have any idea how lonesome I am, so don't mention it.
